

Pupil Premium Expenditure

April 2020 - March 2021

‘The pupil premium is paid to schools as they are best placed to assess what additional provision their pupils need.’

The pupil premium is additional funding given to publicly funded schools in England to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils and to diminish the gap between them and their peers. Pupil premium funding is paid to schools according to the number of pupils who have been:

- registered as eligible for free school meals (FSM) at any point in the last 6 years
- have been looked after for 1 day or more or were adopted from care on or after 30 December 2005

In the 2020 to 2021 financial year, schools will receive £1,345 for each primary-aged pupil eligible for FSM at any point in the last 6 years and £2,300 for each ‘looked-after’ child.

At John Keble the current funding for the financial year 2019 – 2020 is £91,460 (down from £149,160 the previous year). For the forthcoming financial year (2020–21) the allocation is £1345, based on pupils eligible for Pupil Premium Funding, giving us a total of £91,460.

Objectives

The pupil premium money at John Keble is used to remove barriers.

At John Keble School, we have identified the following barriers to learning:

- Inequality of cultural experience / childhood experiences
- Lack of aspirations
- Lack of parenting skills
- Lack of basic literacy/ numeracy skills amongst many parents
- Multi- occupancy
- High numbers of families with complex, multi vulnerabilities requiring support from external agencies

Nature of Support 2020 - 2021

At John Keble School, there is a tailored package of interwoven support which emerges from our 'core practices' which is used to diminish the difference between disadvantaged pupils and their peers as well as providing wider enrichment experiences.

Nature and frequency of support is determined by pupils' identified needs, following half termly pupil Standards with class teachers, Assistant Headteacher/ SENCo, Deputy Head Teacher, support teachers and tracking systems monitored by the Headteacher.

Areas of identified spending will include bought in professional services which focus on pastoral support and focused teacher support. This approach is supported by the research paper, *supporting the attainment of disadvantaged pupil: articulating success and good practice* produced by the National Foundation for Educational Research which identifies several building blocks to success in regards to PP spend. The report states:

'More successful schools tended to have more extensive social and emotional support strategies in place, including developing close links with mental health services, creating a 'social care' hub within the school, providing counselling services and parent liaison staff, alongside teaching and learning interventions.'
